



Monthly Message From Rabbi Bahar

What is the connection between AI and Judaism? Is there one or should there be one?

This is a conversation which is beginning among rabbis, thought leaders and lay leaders not just in Judaism, but among other religious denominations. Currently below is a list of ways that Artificial Intelligence is already starting to impact Judaism.

There is:

- 1. A Haggadah supplement which was written by ChatGPT on Haggadah.com
- 2. Iliff School of Theology now has an Al Institute where it is building a sustainable future for humans and machines. This institute is a graduate Methodist theological school in Denver, Colorado
- 3. Rebbe.IO The World's First Al Rabbi. This is a Chabad Rabbi.
- 4. Sefaria An Online Library for Jewish Sacred Text is starting to integrate ChatGPT to assist in collating sources.

The world that we live in is changing very quickly. And how artificial intelligence will further impact us is, as of yet, unknown. There are individuals who are concerned about what this increased use of artificial intelligence can mean for us as human beings. In 2022, 700 top academics and researchers working in artificial intelligence were surveyed regarding the chance of human extinction or severe disempowerment as a result of AI. The survey results indicated that they predicated a 10% chance of human extinction.[1]

Large language models, which is how AI was built are biased. "A 280 billion parameter model developed in 2021 shows a 29% increase in elicited toxicity over a 117 million parameter model considered the state of the art as of 2018." [2] Meaning that, as of now, AI is full of our bias and toxic thought patterns.

A New York Times reporter asked one of the testers of ChatGPT 4 what thoughts he had about the program. He said: "that testing GPT-4 had caused the person to have an "existential crisis," because it revealed how powerful and creative the A.I. was compared with the tester's own puny brain."[3] ChatGPT 4 was able to pass the bar exam, Biology Olympiad, ace Advanced Placement exams including AP art history and biology as well as getting a near perfect score on the SAT's. It is, furthermore, become a joke for late night TV comedians. What is deeply chilling, though, are the "emergent behaviors" which go beyond what the creators thought the AI would be capable of doing. As a large language model, it is able to predict the next word in a sentence. Creepily, though, it is also able to spontaneously learn new code.

Yuval Harari highlights that before companies are allowed to share drugs on the marketplace they must undergo rigorous safety checks, biotech labs the same for new viruses. Yet Al has already entangled the lives of billions of people since it has been released only a few months ago. What makes it impressive, for Harari, "the ability to manipulate and generate language whether with words, sounds, or images. In the beginning was the word. Language is the operating system of humor and culture."

The ability to understand the Bible was a closely guarded secret. Those who possessed it when it was first developed were the intellectual elite. Language, historically, was always understood to possess great power. The movie franchises "the Terminator" and subsequently "the Matrix" already assumed that human society would be controlled by AI, which would physically map onto our brains. Yet what Chat GPT offers is a verbal control. It uses social media, the illusion of increased efficiency, and the idea that we are in a golden age and that we need to jump on before we miss out - to get people hooked. All of which scream – "Danger Will Robinson."

Yet as a rabbi, I also see the potential. I too can see how it can make different aspects of my job more efficient, I believe that having chat bots may help initially when people are curious about basic questions regarding Judaism. This year, as we gather together for Passover, I decided to write part of the Hagaddah using ChatGPT. I am curious if you can figure out which parts. Perhaps it will help bring us together, perhaps it will be another tool that gets in the way of human connection - only time will tell.
